Beta Mama Pikin Project

BetaMama Pikin is an initiative aimed at addressing maternal and child health challenges caused by poor hygiene, a major contributor to Nigeria's high maternal and child mortality rates. One in five Nigerian children dies before age five, largely due to diarrheal and infectious diseases stemming from unhygienic conditions.

What was your experience as an intern at SRHIN like?

Immersive and exposing.

What specific roles or activities were you involved in as an Intern at SRHIN?

During my internship, I initially worked with the communications & media team before joining the programs team. I contributed to projects, including the Food-in-slum project, Eradicate Hepatitis B project, Adopt-a-school NCD Campaign, Beta-mama Pikin project etc. My roles were diverse and included conducting advocacy visits, managing teams, preparing and delivering letters, stakeholder management, content creation, planning, budgeting, outreach, project monitoring, and evaluation etc.

What have you found to be the most rewarding aspect of your work with SRHin as an Intern?

The most rewarding aspect of my internship was the opportunity to meet and connect with wonderful people with similar values and drive, and my exposure to lots of possibilities in the public health field.

What's a fun go-to strategy you usually adopt for tackling a new challenge?

While I don't necessarily have a "fun" strategy for tackling challenges, I do have a few approaches that help me. When faced with a new challenge, I try to communicate effectively with those I'm working with and senior colleagues to find solutions. Sometimes, I also take time to reflect and recharge, which helps me approach the challenge with clarity. If I see a challenge is beyond what I can bear, I prioritize my well-being.

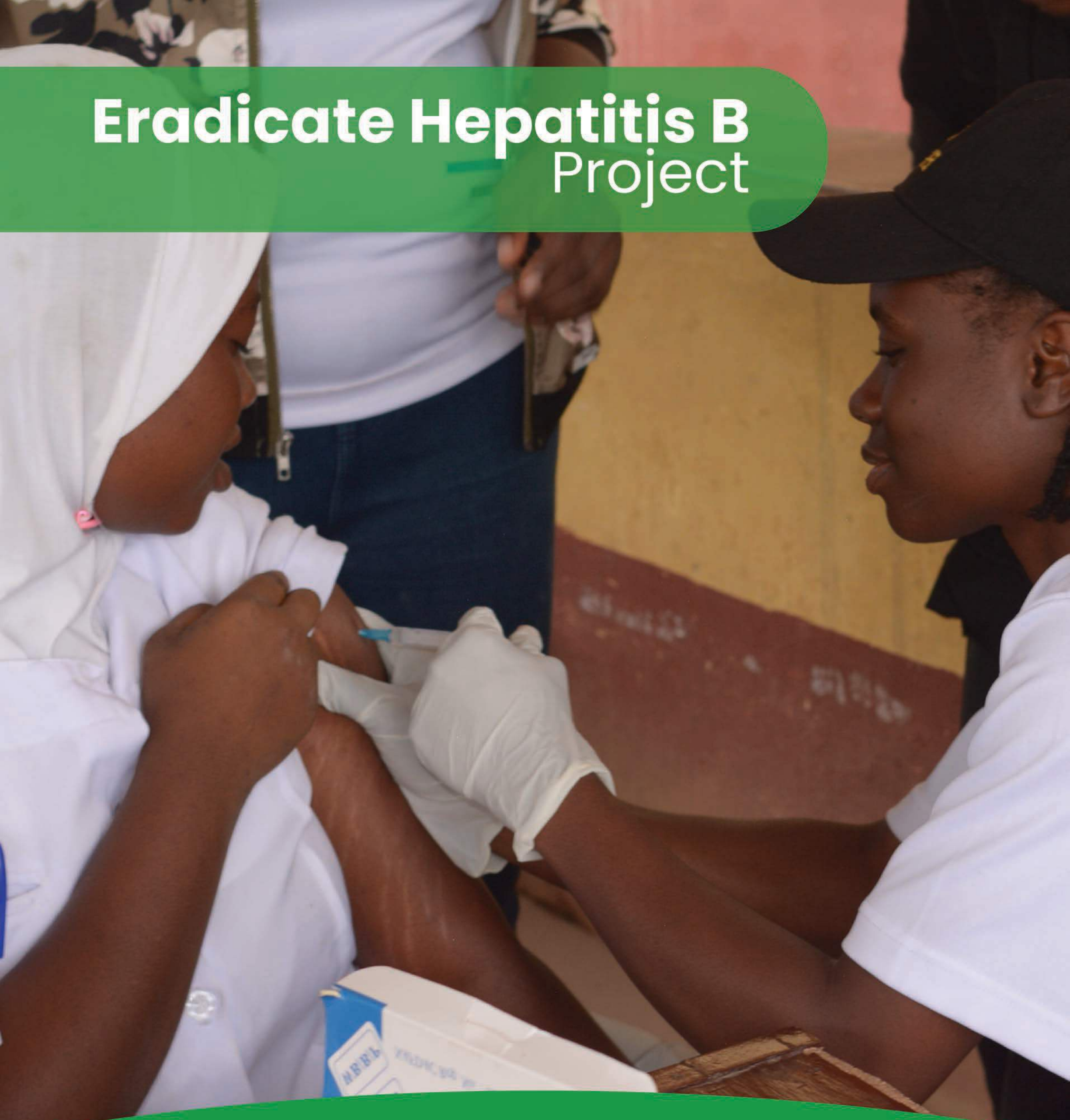
Can you share any success stories or positive outcomes from your efforts?

"I CAN NEVER FORGET..."

What inspired you to become a volunteer with SRHIN?

I was inspired by my need to contribute my quota towards improved health access in my immediate surroundings. I had just completed my undergraduate degree and was preparing for National Youth Service. I had a lot of free time and was looking for possible ways to make the best use of it. So I opened the LinkedIn app that fateful day, typed specific volunteering keywords in the search bar and filtered it to my location, then I came across SRHIN's page and immediately knew it was the place for me.

What are your main motivations for volunteering?

Learning and impacting! I always get geeked about volunteering because I know it's always an opportunity for me to get exposed to the practicalities of knowledge while impacting others in the process. It's a very fulfilling experience.

Can you describe a memorable experience or project you've worked on during your time with SRHIN?

Definitely the Betamama Pikin Project! I was delegated the task to coordinate an entire Primary Health Centre (a beneficiary of the project) and a lot of preparation had to be put in place. Taking up the new responsibility, meeting the PHC head and communicating the vision of the project to her was a thrilling experience because the health workers at the PHC were very warm and receptive which made it easier for me to empathize with the pain points of the community members that used that PHC. I can never forget that moment because it was the beginning of a hitchfree partnership between the PHC and SRHIN.

"THE MOST REWARDING..."

What inspired you to become a Health equity champion?

My journey into health equity was inspired by my passion for addressing disparities in access to health education and services, particularly among adolescents and young people in low-income communities. My experiences working on projects related to HIV prevention, Gender-Based Violence (GBV) prevention, and Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) opened my eyes to the urgent need to bridge gaps in health outcomes and advocate for underserved populations.

What have you found to be the most rewarding aspect of your work as a SHEC champion?

The most rewarding aspect has been the opportunity to see tangible changes in the lives of young people. Knowing that my work equips them with knowledge and tools to make healthier choices and overcome barriers is fulfilling. Additionally, contributing to policy discussions and advocacy that push for systemic changes has been incredibly gratifying.

If you could design a superhero dedicated to promoting health equity, what powers would they have and what would their mission be?

My superhero, Equitas, would possess the power to instantly diagnose and heal diseases in underserved communities while creating an aura of understanding and empathy around stigmatized health issues. Their mission would be to eliminate health disparities by ensuring access to quality healthcare, health education, and social support for everyone, regardless of location or socioeconomic status. They would also have the ability to amplify the voices of marginalized groups in global health policy-making spaces.

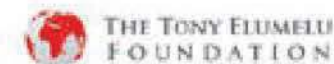

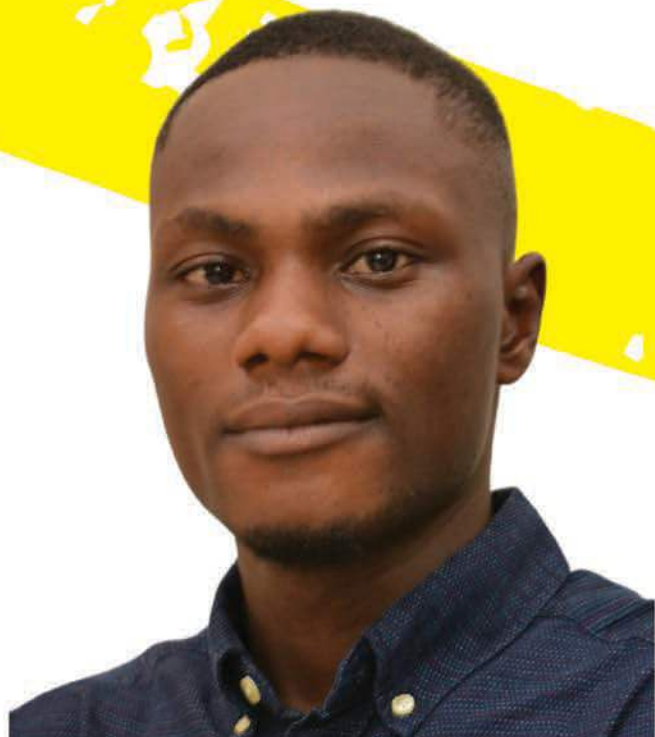

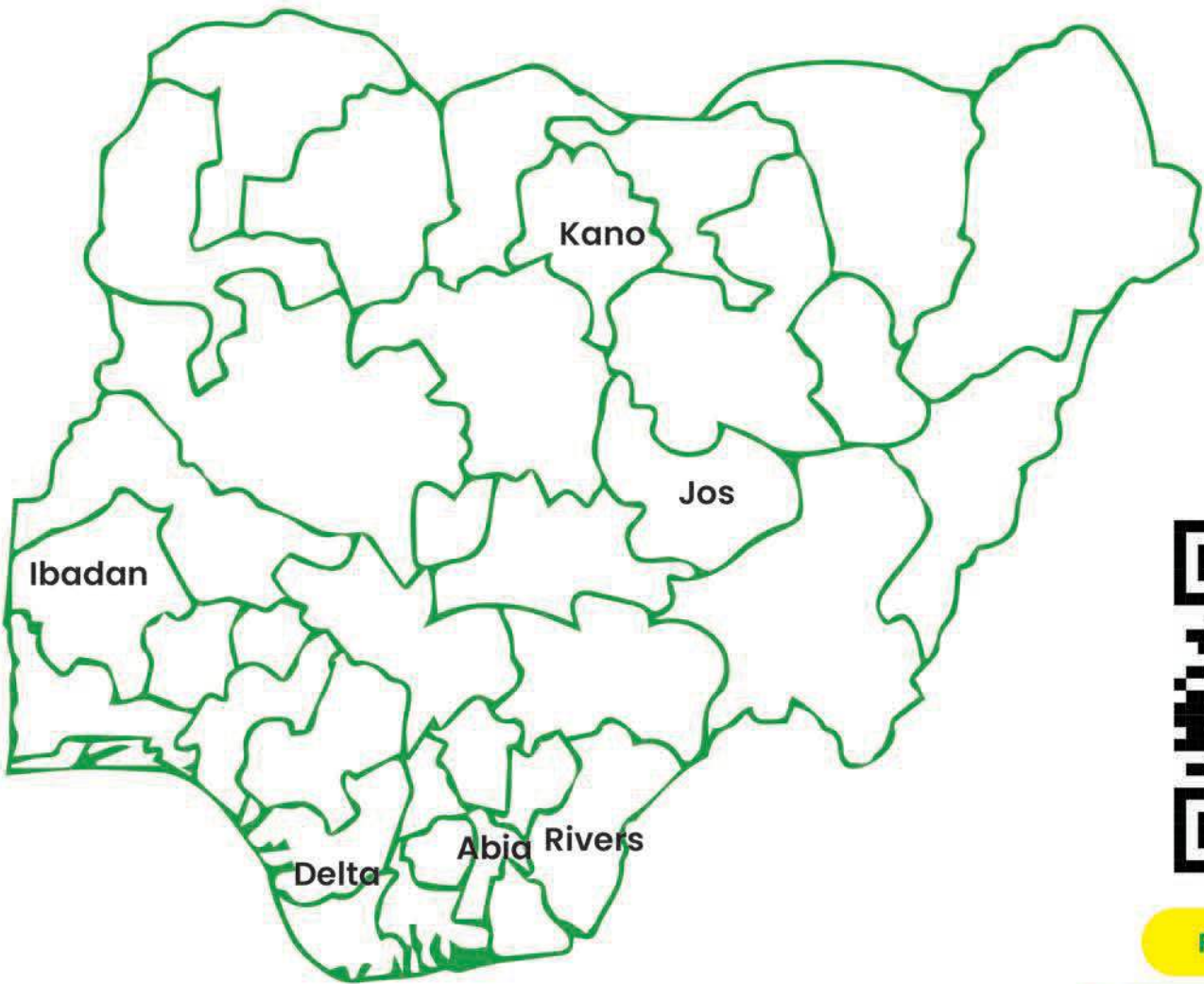
